The 411 Corner

Colleges/universities have many moving parts. These parts need to fit together to ensure that things progress smoothly. To help with this at Knox, and by faculty suggestion, I am adding an information section to my newsletters. The 411 Corner this month concerns advising the second language element (SL).

Advising: The Second Language Requirement

Faculty regulations require that the student must be able to read and write in a second language. To qualify for a SL *substitution* course, they must have studied a language formally in high school. English cannot count as the second language because all Knox students are expected to be proficient in English. If the advisee did not study their language in high school (grades 9–12), then they do not qualify for an SL substitution course... unless they pass an Oral Proficiency Interview.

If the student did not study their language at the high school level, then they may take a proficiency test in that language. This proficiency test is through a third-party (Language Testing International) and costs the student around \$165.00. The "Oral Proficiency Interview" measures

the ability to speak in a language. It is a live, unscripted, 15–30-minute phone conversation with a Certified ACTFL Tester.

Note that there is no longer such a thing as a language "waiver." We have not given waivers for the second language since 2019 when the faculty changed the regulations.

Faculty Funding Opportunities


Old Funding Opportunity

The Mellon Emerging Faculty Leaders (MEFL) are building inclusive campus communities through their teaching, scholarship, and service. Awardees are early-career faculty whose research focuses on contemporary American history, politics, culture, and society. In addition to bringing a diversity of perspectives to their fields, MEFL awardees are building support systems, networks, and affinity groups for their students and peers.

Eligibility:

- Applicants eligible for the Mellon Emerging Faculty Leaders Award will be assistant professors in tenure-track appointments who are pursuing tenure.
- They will have successfully passed the standard third-year/midpoint review or their institution's equivalent no later than January 31, 2025.
- Eligible applicants are typically in the fourth or fifth year of the tenure-track appointment and are still working to complete key items for the tenure dossier, which should not be scheduled for submission prior to the end of the award year (Summer 2026).
- Please note that the award seeks to support progress toward tenure for scholars who are also meaningfully engaged in building campus community; therefore, applicants who are already effectively in a position to go up for tenure.
- Applicants must be U.S. citizens or permanent residents of the United States as of December 1, 2024 (please include a copy of your green card with your application supplemental items if a permanent resident).
