i The 411 Corner

A fellow faculty member requested some information on FERPA, the Family Educational Rights and Privacy Act of 1974. So, let me address FERPA in this month's **411 Corner**.

FERPA is a federal law that protects the privacy of student education records. To oversimplify this complex topic: If something is an educational record, then it must be kept confidential. For faculty, it is an educational record if you wrote on it. So, if you graded an



assignment and tacked it to the bulletin board for a student to pick up later, you violated FERPA. If you handed a graded assignment to one student to take to another who is not there, you violated FERPA. If you posted a list of student names in order of highest to lowest grade in the class... you violated FERPA.

So very many of my teachers over the years violated FERPA repeatedly. Yikes!

If, on the other hand, if you have your students peer-assess and grade each other, you did *not* violate FERPA. This clarification on what constitutes an "educational record" only happened in 2002. So, the case law continues to change and (hopefully) grow more specific.
